PLAN YOUR VISIT

3 Reasons to Arrive Early

AAO 2023, Subspecialty Day meetings, and the AAOE Practice Management Program begin on Friday, Nov. 3, but it might be worth arriving early in San Francisco.

Attend Eyecelerator. On Thursday, Nov. 2, attend Eyecelerator at the San Francisco Marriott Marquis. A partnership between the Academy and the American Society of Cataract and Refractive Surgery, Eyecelerator aims to showcase innovation in eye care. Learn more at www.eyecelerator.com.

Visit the Truhlsen-Marmor Museum of the Eye. See the special exhibition, titled "Decoding the Eye: Signs & Symbols," at the Truhlsen-Marmor Museum of the Eye. AAO 2023 attendees who visit with their badge will receive a museum tote bag. Learn more about the museum at aao.org/museum.

Explore San Francisco. Spend a little extra time in the City by the Bay to visit some of its restaurants, parks, museums, and other attractions. San Francisco has 31 Michelin-starred restaurants, and eateries to satisfy a wide variety of cravings and curiosities.

San Francisco's parks are worth a jaunt across the city. Golden Gate Park is 20% bigger than New York's Central Park and is home to a botanical garden,

conservatory of flowers, a Japanese tea garden, multiple museums, two windmills, a Ferris wheel, and a herd of bison. The Presidio is a former U.S. Army post with forests of redwood, cypress, and eucalyptus trees, as well as beaches and views of the Golden Gate Bridge.

Other worthwhile excursions include the city's many museums, such as the San Francisco Museum of Modern Art, which is right around the corner from the convention center; Alcatraz tours (book at www.alcatrazislandtickets. com); and cable car rides—the Powell/ Hyde line drops you off right by the Truhlsen-Marmor Museum of the Eye after offering expansive views of the bay from atop Russian Hill.

What's included. AAO 2023 registration includes the Opening Session, all instruction courses, clinical sessions, Skills Transfer lectures, videos, papers, poster presentations, the Expo, and Showcase Theater sessions. It also provides access to AAO 2023 Virtual.

Some tickets required. Skills Transfer labs and AAOE Practice Management Friday Intensives are ticketed events that can be purchased during registration. Note that Subspecialty Day and AAOE Coding Sessions require separate registration.

Subspecialty Day. Registration for the in-person Subspecialty Day meetings (Friday, Nov. 3, and Saturday, Nov. 4) includes the flexibility to float among Subspecialty Day meetings taking place the same day. Also included are detailed

course syllabi, meals, and access to the Subspecialty Day Virtual content from that same day.

NEURO-OPHTHALMOLOGY 2023:

When Should I Worry? Concerning Signs, Symptoms, and Findings in Neuro-Ophthalmology

Program directors: Peter A. Quiros, MD, and Madhura A. Tamhankar, MD.

When: Friday, Nov. 3.

Directors' preview. The Neuro-Ophthalmology Subspecialty Day meeting will discuss clinical situations that often challenge the practicing ophthalmologist.

Topics will include systemic medications that can have neuro-ophthalmic adverse effects, treating patients with optic disc edema, neuro-ophthalmic mimics with or without vision loss, and new onset diplopia. Cases will be presented to an expert panel for an interactive discussion, and presenters will ask the audience to contribute to the conversation.

At the end of the day, attendees will be able to recognize neuro-ophthalmic side effects of systemic medications; differentiate the etiology of visual loss in patients presenting with optic disc edema; characterize symptoms such as photophobia and hemeralopia, as they can mimic neuro-ophthalmic disease; and recognize crucial neuro-ophthalmic findings in those who have new onset diplopia.

The Neuro-Ophthalmology Subspecialty Day meeting is organized in conjunction with the North American Neuro-Ophthalmology Society.
