REFRACTIVE SURGERY 2021: How Can We Do Better?

One result of the pandemic is a growing interest in refractive surgery in many countries. This year, the theme of the International Society of Refractive Surgery (ISRS) meeting is "How Can We Do Better?" In other words, how can refractive specialists deliver the best results to patients? Highlighting this theme will be a lecture titled "Building on New Interest in Refractive Surgery
