



Author Checklist for Pearls Article

Before submitting your article, please review this checklist.

PHYSICIAN INFORMATION

- Contact info of corresponding physician (including back-up email and phone if the corresponding author is out of contact)
- Biographical information about the authors (e.g., Dr. Wwww is an ophthalmology resident, and Dr. Xxxxx is professor of ophthalmology; both are at the Yyyy Eye Institute in City, State.)
- Financial disclosure (e.g., Dr. Wwww consults for CompanyX and lectures for CompanyY.)
- If you are a student, resident, or fellow, the manuscript must include a faculty member as a co-author to critically review and edit the manuscript for content accuracy and clarity of writing.

NOTE: Subspecialty articles must include at least one senior author in that subspecialty.

IMAGES

- Resolution. Digital images must be at least 300 dpi at 4 inches inches. (EyeNet can check resolution if you are unsure.) in JPG, TIF, EPS and BMP formats.
- Captions
- Photo credit
- Permission to use online and to reprint
- If patient's identity is apparent in the photo, you must write a note in the manuscript of in a separate email to the editor confirming that you have on file the patient's permission to use the image
- Please send images as separate files, not embedded in the Word document.
- Video? If you have a video related to the case, please send it along, as we are likely to want to include it on EyeNet's website as a "Multimedia Extra"

CITATIONS

- Citations need to be numbered in order in the text.
- Limit footnotes to fewer than 10, using these guidelines:
 - Do not use a reference when stating information that is well established or is readily available through textbooks.
 - Use references when you:
 - present specific data or research findings.
 - discuss material that is speculative, new, or controversial—that is, not yet part of the mainstream.
 - Use one reference, rather than several, to support a statement

STORY LENGTH

- Length: approximately 1,500 words.
