

PLAN YOUR VISIT

3 Reasons to Arrive Early

AAO 2024, Subspecialty Day meetings, AAOP Friday Intensives, and the AAOE Practice Management Program begin on Friday, Oct. 18, but it might be worth arriving early in Chicago.

Attend Eyecelerator. On Thursday, Oct. 17, attend Eyecelerator at McCormick Place. A partnership between the Academy and the American Society of Cataract and Refractive Surgery, Eyecelerator aims to showcase innovation in eye care. Learn more at www.eyecelerator.com.

Visit the Museum of Science and Industry. Chicago is home to the biggest science museum in the Western Hemisphere: the Museum of Science and Industry. Don't miss a chance to see the special exhibition, "90 & Beyond: Our Stories, Your MSI," celebrating the museum's 90th year. Other attractions include "The Blue Paradox," an immersive experience exploring the effect of plastic pollution on oceans, and an exhibit about how the response to COVID-19 was shaped by experiences with earlier pandemics. Explore Chicago. Spend a little extra time in the Windy City to visit some of its unique neighborhoods. Local re-

searchers have mapped out 77 community areas in Chicago.

Consider visiting the Ukrainian Village on the near west side with two Ukrainian cathedrals (one Catholic and the other Ukrainian Orthodox), shops, and restaurants, and the Ukrainian National Museum of Chicago.

Wicker Park is a great neighborhood for vintage shopping, dive bars, and hip restaurants. It's known for its street art murals. The Violet Hour is a cocktail lounge with a revolving mural on its façade. Adjacent Bucktown has more upscale boutique shopping.

Those looking for some green space will enjoy **Lincoln Park**. The neighborhood's namesake park is home to an expansive lakefront park that offers dramatic city views, as well as a botanical garden, a beach, a hidden lily pond, and a free zoo. Outside of the park, you'll find historic row homes and charming

shops and eateries. There are four Michelin-star restaurants in Lincoln Park, including Alinea, a three-star restaurant.

REGISTRATION

Registration Opens June 26

For Academy, American Academy of Ophthalmic Executives (AAOE), and American Academy of Ophthalmic Professionals (AAOP) members, AAO 2024 registration and ticket sales open on June 26. Nonmembers can register starting July 10.

What's included. AAO 2024 registration includes the Opening Session, symposia, all instruction courses, Skills Transfer lectures, original paper sessions, videos, posters, and access to content on AAO 2024 Virtual. In addition, attendees can network and learn in the Expo. There, they will



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find exhibiting companies; the Academy Resource Center, Learning Lounge, and Poster Theater; the new Academy Theater, which will feature sessions on Academy education, advocacy, and research initiatives; the new Innovation Theater, which will cover advances in artificial intelligence, care delivery, and digital health care; and the Showcase Theater, which features industry presentations.

Extra events. Skills Transfer labs, AAOE Friday Intensives, and AAOP Friday Intensives are ticketed events that can be purchased during registration. Note that Subspecialty Day meetings, AAOE Coding Camp, and AAOE Fundamentals of Ophthalmic Coding are their own meetings that require separate registration.

Subspecialty Day. Registration for the in-person Subspecialty Day meetings (Friday, Oct. 18, and Saturday, Oct. 19) includes the flexibility to float among Subspecialty Day meetings taking place the same day. Also included are detailed course syllabi available online, meals, and access to the Subspecialty Day Virtual content from that same day.

It pays to register early. Registration fees and ticket fees increase starting Aug. 8. Ticketed sessions can fill up fast, so don't delay.

Can't make it to Chicago? Register for AAO 2024 Virtual, Subspecialty Day Virtual–Friday, Subspecialty Day Virtual–Saturday, or all three. You will be able to watch sessions streaming live, view sessions that were recorded in Chicago, and see on-demand-only content that was developed specifically for the virtual meeting.

The Academy does not partner with any third-party organizations for meeting registration so you should only register through the Academy's website, aao.org/registration. When booking your hotel room, use the link on aao.org/hotels to the Academy's only official hotel reservation provider, Expovision.

Search the Program in the Meeting Guide

The online Meeting Guide (aao.org/mobile), sponsored in part by Genentech and available starting June 17, is your go-to resource for AAO 2024. No need to log in. You do not need to sign in to browse the program. Type your inquiry into the search bar or use the filters to find sessions by day, topic, special interest, or presenter. You will find full course information, abstracts, and (when available) handouts.

It is strongly recommended that you attend the associated didactic lecture that precedes the hands-on learning. These lectures are included with your meeting registration.

All Skill Transfer labs require a separate lab ticket. Purchase tickets early when you register for AAO 2024. Many labs sell out quickly.

Attend the Spotlight on Cataract

Don't miss the must-attend Spotlight on Cataract, which takes place on Monday, Oct. 21.

Rapid-fire mini-lectures and spontaneous panel discussions are built around video cases of intraoperative or postoperative complications. Throughout the session, audience members are asked to weigh in with their case management choices via audience polling.

The session concludes with the Charles D. Kelman Lecture, which will be given this year by **Graham D. Barrett, MBBCH**, a consultant ophthalmic surgeon at Sir Charles Gairdner Hospital and a Clinical Professor in the University of Western Australia's Centre for Ophthalmology and Visual Science. He has made many influential contributions to the field, including the development of intraocular implants, phacoemulsification equipment, and instruments for cataract surgery, including the Barrett toric calculator.

Subspecialty Day Previews

This month, program directors from two Subspecialty Day meetings preview some of this year's highlights.

NEURO-OPTHALMOLOGY 2024:

When Should I Worry? The Pearls and Pitfalls of Tests and Diagnoses in Neuro-Ophthalmology

When: Friday, Oct. 18.

Directors' preview. The Neuro-Ophthalmology Subspecialty Day meeting will discuss clinical situations that often challenge the practicing ophthalmologist, including interpretation of OCT in the context of neuro-ophthalmic conditions; ordering and interpretation of laboratory tests that may provide a false sense of security, especially when managing vision threatening diseases such as giant cell arteritis; MRI "abnormalities" that may or may not indicate the presence of a neurological condition and how to act on them; and ending with an update on the surgical management of thyroid eye disease and orbital lesions.

Cases will be presented to an expert panel for an interactive discussion. In addition, presenters will poll the audience about their next steps and then see if the panelists agree.

At the end of the program, attendees will be able to recognize the importance of ordering appropriate diagnostic tests and will have learned about pearls and pitfalls of OCT, correctly interpreting laboratory data, recognizing relevant neuroimaging findings in various neuro-ophthalmic conditions, and approaches to managing orbital conditions. This session will help the practicing ophthalmologist arrive at an accurate diagnosis, order appropriate tests, counsel patients on results of testing, and determine appropriate initial management based on best practices.

UVEITIS 2024: Rising to New Heights

When: Friday, Oct. 18.

Directors' preview. "Rising to New Heights" was chosen as the subtitle for Uveitis Subspecialty Day 2024, in line with the annual meeting's overall theme Elevate. Each Uveitis Subspecialty Day session title references a tall Chicago landmark building, alluding to our goal of reaching higher standards for accurate diagnosis and effective treatment of ocular inflammation. The planning committee has crafted an engaging day of education appropriate for all ophthalmologists.

Uveitis Subspecialty Day will include familiar and new features. The 2024 meeting will continue the highly successful format of short overviews followed by case-based discussions of the major anatomic categories of uveitis: anterior, intermediate, posterior, and panuveitis. The cases will focus on providing memorable teaching points to take back to your home clinic. Case presenters will be joined by experienced discussants who will provide additional context and pearls of wisdom.

Following the anatomic sessions, two series of lectures are devoted to covering both surgical and medical aspects of treatment of uveitis and its complications.

New in 2024, there will be a debates session to cover topics in ocular inflammation, such as the role of anterior chamber taps in the diagnosis of anterior uveitis and local versus systemic therapy for both noninfectious and infectious forms of uveitis. Experts in the field will make a case for their side of the argument, and the audience will vote on the most convincing line of reasoning.

The day concludes with "Late Breaking Presentations," which will highlight findings from several clinical trials with results available in the fall of 2024.
