■ Use My Expo to Navigate the Exhibit Hall

Step 3—Print a personalized list of exhibitors. Now you'll be ready for the exhibit hall.

Check Your E-Mail for Academy Live, the Daily E-Bulletin

From Friday through Monday, look for *Academy Live*, a brief bulletin that is e-mailed in the evening to all Academy members and Annual Meeting registrants. Each edition includes succinct reports from some of that day's clinical news presented in New Orleans.

Read Academy News for Interviews, EHR Tips, and the Directors' Picks

The first edition—available Friday—includes tips for Saturday's Subspecialty Day, a guide to EHR exhibitors, and other highlights. The program directors recommend presentations to attend on Saturday, selected from more than 65 hours of Subspecialty Day programming. Albert, MD, profiles of this year's Guests of Honor, a guide to imaging devices, and tips on becoming a presenter next year.

By utilizing the Mobile Meeting Guide (<u>www.aao.org/mobile</u>) and other resources, your mobile device can help make your time much more productive.

Get yourself oriented. The Mobile Meeting Guide can help ensure you get to your event rooms and other appointments on time. You can use it to access:

- 1. Shuttle bus schedules.
- 2. Floor plans for the course rooms and exhibit hall.
- 3. Full program content, including abstracts.
- 4. An online calendar that you can use to build your schedule of events so you'll know exactly where you'll need to be (see "Know Your Agenda" on page 89).



Make the most of the presentations and posters. Your mobile device can be a useful adjunct during this year's program through the following features:

- 5. Event handouts—these are best viewed on a tablet rather than a smartphone.
- 6. Questions for the moderator—at some events, the audience is encouraged to text or e-mail questions.

- 8. Audio for scientific posters—scan the QR code at each poster to view the poster online and, where available, listen to the authors' commentary.

- 9. AAO Virtual Meeting—enjoy events that you can't attend in person.
- 10. Academy Live—check your e-mail for a daily bulletin of clinical news.

An Academy Plus Course Pass Gives You Flexibility

With the Academy Plus course pass, you have the flexibility to attend any of the more than 350 Academy and AAOE instruction courses. Float among the courses that interest you most—but remember that popular courses may fill up early. Due to Fire Marshal regulations, seating capacities are limited. Seating will be available on a first-come basis, so please plan accordingly.

Academy Plus is only for instruction courses. Tickets are still required for certain types of events, such as Breakfast With the Experts roundtables and Skills Transfer labs. Other events, such as symposia, are free if you show your Annual Meeting badge.

Buy the course pass onsite. Go to Hall C and buy the Academy Plus course pass at the Registration area or at the Ticketed Events area. It costs \$275. (Members in Training pay a reduced fee of \$100.)

Course Evaluations—When You Arrive at a Course, Make Sure Your Badge Is Scanned

This year, there will be a bar code on your Annual Meeting badge. Staff stationed at each instruction course will scan your badge. (This won't happen at ticketed events, such as Skills Transfer labs.) Each day, an e-mail will be sent confirming the instruction courses at which your badge was scanned, with links to their evaluations.

What if your badge doesn't get scanned? If you missed getting scanned, go to the Evaluation Help desk at Ticketed Events in Hall C. You can also fill out evaluations online using the Mobile Meeting Guide (search

for the course and then select the "Evaluation" button).

What About CME for Program Activity?

Getting your badge scanned (see previous story) does not automatically grant CME. You still need to record your own educational activities. You can do so at one of the CME Reporting/ Proof-of-Attendance stations, which

are located in three areas: Lobby B2, Lobby G, and the Academy Resource Center (Hall G, Booth 3239). While you're in New Orleans, you also can report your CME online; instructions will be e-mailed to you once your attendance has been verified. Please note: You should claim only the credit commensurate with the extent of your participation.
