
### Prepare for the Exhibition: 3 Things You Need to Do

When you have only limited time to be in the exhibit hall, you can use the Virtual Exhibition to target the companies and products that you wish to visit. Here's how.

Step 1: Create a My Expo account. Go to <u>www.aao.org/virtualexhibition</u>, select My Expo, and create an account by entering your e-mail address and choosing a password.

Step 2: Tag exhibitors you want to see. Search this year's exhibitors by company name, booth number, product category, and subspecialty. Use the "Tag" button to add companies to (or delete them from) the list of exhibitors you want to visit.

Step 3: Print a personalized map of the exhibit hall. Your personalized
