



8 Ways the Moscone Center Is Reducing Conference Waste

While you're attending this year's annual meeting, check out some of the Moscone Center's "green" efforts, including initiatives to reduce waste, build more planet-friendly exhibits, and improve water and energy management.¹

Reducing, Reusing, and Recycling

- 1. Compost, recycling, and trash collection areas for attendees. San Francisco requires all large venues to provide color-coded "zero waste" collection stations, with separate bins for different types of waste—for recyclables, compostables, and trash. If you are unsure which bin to use, you can find a cheat sheet at www.recology.com/re cology-san-francisco/what-goes-where.
- 2. Sorting for sustainability behind the scenes. Moscone's loading dock staff capture recyclables generated from the exhibit floor and large catered functions.
- 3. Certified compostable cups and utensils only. Moscone follows San Francisco's requirement that all providers of takeaway food use certified compostable serveware only. Because of this, there won't be single-use plastic water bottles at AAO 2023. Bring a re-

usable bottle to fill at one of numerous hydration stations.

Erecting Earth-Friendly Exhibits

- 4. Foam bans. All polystyrene materials that come into the building are required to be taken out of the building. Moscone encourages exhibitors to create environmentally friendly booths that use "rapid renewables," such as bamboo and wheatboard, and to print with vegetable-based inks.
- 5. Curbing single-use disposable plastic bags. San Francisco's Checkout Bag Charge and Recyclable or Compostable Pre-Checkout Bag Ordinance prohibits the distribution of single-use plastic bags.

Conserving Water and Energy

- **6. Solar power efforts.** Moscone boasts the largest rooftop solar installation by area in San Francisco. The system capacity is 687 kw.
- 7. Greenhouse gas-free electricity. Moscone North, South, and West are supplied by 100% greenhouse gas-free

electricity from San Francisco's Public Utilities Commission.

8. Innovative water technologies. Moscone North and South are now designed to collect and treat more than 15 million gallons of foundation water, rainwater, and condensate water, which is reused in plumbing and landscape irrigation.

This month, program directors from two Subspecialty Day meetings preview some of this year's highlights.

OCULAR ONCOLOGY AND PATHOLOGY

2023: Myth or Reality? Wide-Opening Breakthroughs in Ophthalmic Oncology and Pathology Program directors: Miguel A. Materin, MD, and Claudia Maria Prospero Ponce, MD.

When: Friday, Nov. 3

Directors' preview. This Subspecialty Day meeting will cover the myths and realities of Ocular Oncology and Pathology.

We will inform attendees of the newest discoveries and breakthroughs, including liquid biopsy application for uveal melanoma, retinoblastoma, and other cancers, and the possibility of using artificial intelligence in ophthalmic oncology and pathology.

For the first time, the meeting will also address the value of diversity, equity, and inclusion in our practices.

Ocular Oncology and Pathology Subspecialty Day meeting is organized in conjunction with the American Association of Ophthalmic Oncologists and Pathologists.

RETINA 2023: Looking to the Future Program directors: Timothy G. Murray, MD, MBA, and Barbara Ann Blodi, MD.

When: Friday, Nov. 3, and Saturday, Nov. 4

Directors' preview. We aim to provide a comprehensive and focused retina update. New this year, Retina Subspecialty Day will feature three talks on diversity. We have expanded the program to include retina specialists who will address diversity in our ophthalmic communities (in both private practice and academic ophthalmology departments) as well as diversity issues in patient care and clinical trials.

Joan W. Miller, MD, chair of ophthalmology at Harvard Medical School, will speak on building an inclusive and diverse community in ophthalmology. An important component in establishing a pipeline of diverse retina specialists is by recruiting, mentoring, and retaining diversity within the retina community.

Julia A. Haller, MD, ophthalmologist-in-chief at Wills Eye Hospital, will present evidence from large patient databases regarding the treatment of

two common retinal disorders, diabetic macular edema and retinal vein occlusion. From these databases, we can identify substantial treatment differences based on gender, race, ethnicity, and age. In addition, significant disparities persist in enrollment of patients in retina clinical trials.

Adrienne Williams Scott, MD. associate professor of ophthalmology at Wilmer Eye Institute, will present evidence that non-white patients, as well as patients from rural and socioeconomically disadvantaged backgrounds, are underrepresented in clinical trials of diabetic retinopathy, diabetic macular edema, and retinal vein occlusion.

Identifying disparities in retinal patient care and clinical trial enrollment is a first step toward improving quality of care for all.

The Retina Subspecialty Day meeting is organized in conjunction with the American Society of Retina Specialists, the Macula Society, the Retina Society, and Club Jules Gonin.
